WELCOME

Welcome all members who are joining the Homecell!

WORSHIP

Please set up 1 praise song and 1 worship song. End Worship in prayer.

WORD

Start by asking members who would like to share, what stood out for them from this week Sunday's sermon?

Ask a homecell member to read: Romans 2:4 NKJV

Q: What is the difference between saying "God is good" and trusting that God is good when life is confusing?

A: Saying it can be a phrase or church language. Trusting it means holding onto God's character when the evidence around you feels incomplete. It means admitting, "I know in part, but I know God is good."

Q: Why is John 3:16 important for understanding God's heart toward the world?

A: It says God loved the world, not that God hated, despised, or was merely disappointed with the world. The cross is not proof that God wanted to destroy humanity. It is proof that God loved and gave His Son.



Ask homecell members to read: 2 Corinthians 5:7; 17; Phillipians 1:6

Pastor Aidan touched on the importance of keeping a moral high ground in our every day life and situations we face.

Q: How can someone keep the moral high ground in business or work when shortcuts seem profitable?

A: By remembering that God is the source, not manipulation or corruption. A believer can choose honesty, transparency, and trust even when a dishonest path looks faster. Walking by faith means refusing to sell character for temporary gain

Q: How does Philipians 1:6 encourage someone who knows they still have areas of weakness?

A: It reminds them that God is not finished with them. Integrity is not pretending to be perfect. It is yielding to the good work God is doing and allowing Him to continue shaping the areas that need healing and maturity.

Ask a homecell member to read Revelation 1:8; 21:6 NKJV; Galatians 2:21 NKJV

Q: What comfort does Revelation 1:8 and Revelation 21:6 give to believers?

A: Jesus is the beginning and the end. He is not only the starter of faith but the completer. Our confidence rests in who He is, not in our ability to become the omega of our own salvation story.

Q: Galatians 2:21 says not to frustrate the grace of God. How do people frustrate grace?

A: By mixing grace with self-salvation, fear, old covenant performance, or the belief that Christ must keep redoing what He has already completed. Grace is frustrated when we act as if the cross was not enough.

Ask homecell member to read Matthew 25:14-30 NKJV

Q: How did the one-talent servant's view of the master shape his actions?

A: He believed the master was harsh and demanding, so he acted from fear. Instead of using what was given, he protected himself and hid the gift. Wrong theology produced wrong living.

Q: How does knowing God as good help us use our gifts better?

A: When we know God is good, we are less afraid of failure and less driven by performance. We can steward what He gave us with joy. We serve from acceptance, not for acceptance.



Q: What does maturity look like in this area?

A: Maturity is moving from milk to meat: receiving God's goodness, thinking like a son or daughter, and taking responsibility for what He has placed in our hands. It is not pressure to become someone else. It is faithfulness with what God gave you.

CHALLENGE/REFLECTION:

Remember: Internal growth/health enables external impact – a revelation of God's love for you leads to you loving your world – let's invite our unreached worlds to church on Sunday so they can encounter the love of Jesus for themselves!
